And likewise, I propose that any people who, upon receiving a beautiful Earth from the Creator, proceed to destroy it and render it unlivable can be called ungrateful.

This summer I read *The Uninhabitable Earth: Life After Warming*, by journalist David Wallace-Wells. It's a breathtaking view of what has happened, is happening, and is on the way to happening on planet earth because of human patterns in our current and recent civilizational moment, and the very first line of the book gets your attention: "It is worse, much worse, than you think." I read those opening words, my heart pounded, and I kept reading, to the end. This author doesn't say anything a lot of other scientists, researchers and writers haven't also said, and have been saying for decades: we've already done a huge amount of damage to this earth and its natural systems, some of it already irreversible, and now the urgent challenge is not to do even more, while there's still a small amount of time to change course and keep this planet habitable for our children and grandchildren.

The weather events in just our own country as of late – worse fires, bigger, stronger and more frequent storms, hotter temperatures – ought to have awakened us, if we weren't already. Response to climate crisis is a central moral issue for people of faith, those for whom the natural world isn't just so many elements, gases and species, but *creation*. God's creation. The gift of a benevolent Creator, infused with the love of that Creator, and given to the creatures with the idea that we would love it too, and take care of it. That's going to take a change of course. Which, in turn, is going to take a change of heart.


I think of a memorable line from the writings of the spiritually- and environmentally-oriented poet and novelist Wendell Berry: "Whether we and our politicians know it or not, Nature is party to all our deals and decisions, and she has more votes, a longer memory, and a sterner sense of justice than we do." That gets your attention too.

It is time, and past time, for people of faith to see this as what some voices are calling it: THE central moral issue of our time. May our hearts, minds and spirits be ready and willing to engage.

Target, Walmart or Amazon are always good cards to have on hand for last minute needs or gifts that just about everyone can use. Of course, grocery stores remain our most popular cards - Stop and Shop and Shop Rite are available every week in different denominations. The ways you can use Scrip gift cards are only limited by your imagination! And don't forget that every card you purchase – big or small – earns money for our church.


