You are given the questions of others as if they were answers to all you ask. Yes, perhaps this gift is your answer.

We are coming up on the end of the academic year at Yale Divinity School, where for the past eleven years, I've been part of a teaching team for a course in pastoral theology & care. It aims to help students learn the basic skills for being present in caring, supportive ways with those whose lives and stories they will encounter when they become pastors or chaplains. When we get to the end of the semester, I always share with my particular group of students Denise Levertov's poem "A Gift," as I can think of no better way to describe pastoral ministry than its opening line: *"Just when you seem to yourself/nothing but a flimsy web of questions/you are given the questions of others to hold/in the emptiness of your hands..."* All through the semester, the students have had to encounter what it means to be invited into the life of another, entrusted to hold some significant wondering or dilemma with them, all the while quite possibly feeling that they are, themselves, nothing but a flimsy web of questions don't have to be barriers or obstacles to our staying present with other humans in theirs. In fact, the more conscious we can stay of what feels unresolved or uncertain or inadequate in ourselves, the more we can compassionately accompany another who might be in that same kind of place.

The thing is, this wisdom isn't just for pastors. All of us have experiences when we are "given the questions of others to hold," invited into someone's life at a time when it's our presence and care that are needed to help them know their own strengths and possibilities. This goes with the human journey. This goes with being the Jesus community, the Body of Christ, in the world. This goes with the inherent hopefulness of Easter season – where, to use Levertov's imagery, songbird eggs become butterflies that we get to hold, if we tend them lovingly and are careful not to injure them.

In the beauty and hopefulness of this season, as shaky as we ourselves might sometimes feel, let's remember how much we need each other's presence, how we are entrusted to handle each other with care.... and how much gift there is in that.

#### **Changes coming to the Scrip Program!**

Coming in May, the official name of the Scrip program will be changing from ShopWithScrip to RaiseRight. When they launched the mobile app, they enhanced the way participants could shop for and access their gift cards, making it even easier to fundraise anytime, anywhere. Now, those same great features will be available on the website too—all under one name, RaiseRight.

If you don't currently use the website or mobile app, you will see no difference to how we run the fundraiser at church or how you make out your check when you purchase a card (still paid to FCCCC, and you can note "scrip" in the memo line). If you ever visit shopwithscrip.com to view the retailers that are available or place an order with through your online account, that website name will eventually be changing to RaiseRight.

Sunday coffee hours matter to all of us! Please use the sign-up sheet to take a Sunday. Thank you!




