### **COMMUNITIES OF RITUAL**





As I write this, it is the day of the funeral of Queen Elizabeth II in London, and I have watched some television coverage of the events. If you watched any too, you know the British way with pageantry and ritual was on full display for days after the queen passed and through the day of her funeral: carefully choreographed processions, royal palace honor guards, elaborately costumed, standing watch by a coffin draped and adorned with the symbols of monarchy, the spectacular space of Westminster Abbey for the funeral service itself, family members and others all precisely placed, moving together when it was their duty to move, standing in silent reverence when silence was called for. As more than one commentator noted, "Nobody does pomp like the British."

And while that degree of ceremony is beyond what any of us is likely to experience, and may seem excessive by everyday standards, what strikes me about ritual is how universal it is, how much humans seem to need it as a way of making meaning or expressing meaning. Thinking a thought by ourselves does not have the same impact as being in a community of others who are thinking that thought, and doing something ritualistic together to give it importance. Theologian Harvey Cox once noted that "no other species relives the stories of their ancestors, blows out candles on a birthday cake, or dresses up as something else." Humans develop rituals that hold our stories and the meaning we give them, because somehow the rituals become containers for meaning and can carry more than words alone.

Religious communities know this instinctively. Even a small, simple and relatively informal local church has important rituals: lighting candles, standing to sing, joining voices in unison prayers and responses, taking together the bread of Communion, blessing together the water of baptism. Each time we gather, we tell again the story of who we are as the people of God, and we reinforce our belonging in that story by practicing our place in that community and its precious rituals of meaning.

The next time you come to worship, try to notice three things in the service that are ritual in nature. We are not a "high church" tradition, but we have our rituals. And no matter how simple they may be, they are speaking to us and forming us, telling us a sacred story, every single time we experience them.

October is disability awareness month. In the UCC, the 2<sup>nd</sup> Sunday of the month is marked as "Access Sunday". It is a day that those in the UCC will join together in celebrating the gifts of persons with disabilities and the strides that the church has made in becoming more accessible. It is also a day that the church can acknowledge the journey yet to be taken with our siblings with disabilities.

For the last number of years, I have been honored to be a part of the Disability Ministries team of the SNE UCC (and the CT UCC before that). In the time I was on the team, I learned so much about the steps we can take to not only make our churches more accessible, but to make ourselves more accessible, to people with disabilities. It's not all about elevators and ramps, t-coils and large print bulletins. We have to be engaged, even if that means being vulnerable. We have to not turn away because we don't know what to say – or are afraid of saying the wrong thing.

There are many small steps we can take in our church and in our lives to be more open to people with disabilities. As a team member, I learned about the Accessible to All program and checklist. There are also people that will come to any church to do a physical audit and give you a list of small and large changes you can make in your building and programming. As I write this, two members of our congregation are preparing messages for the church service on Sept. 25 on "Why Church?" So, I thought I would offer a reflection on "Why Church School?" What is meaningful about our 40 minutes spent with your children each Sunday.

Yes, there is community, intergenerational activities, friendships being built, ritual, celebration, and precious family time. In addition, children are led to explore big ideas. These are ideas from Jesus's teachings that are experienced in activities that challenge young minds and creative spirits, ideas that the children practice with the understanding that there is no such thing as getting it "wrong" or making a "mistake." There is only learning in each activity with the intent of owning more and more of what Jesus came to share: compassion, gratitude, appreciating the light that each one carries within them, kindness, offering one's gifts to complete a challenge, honoring commitments to each other. It's not that these ideas are unique to Church School, but to work with them intentionally inspires understanding them at a deeper level. I am reminded of a three-year-old who, after scribbling on a paper sun that was attached to a piece of yarn and placed over her head so that it lay against her chest, told Karen and me, "I am the light."

Isn't this the goal, to recognize the light in everyone we meet!

# Scrip is Fundraising While You Shop!



Scrip is a fundraising program that our church been participating in for over 6 years. Church members can purchase gift cards for over 750 retailers. You pay face value, but the church buys them for less, thus the fundraising! Every time you buy a card through us, you're raising money for our church!

In order to continue and grow on our success, we need more shoppers! You don't have to make a purchase every week, or even every month. Give it a try if you haven't yet – every single purchase helps! While most people think of buying gift cards for presents, you can also just buy them for yourself to use in place of cash or credit at local grocery stores, restaurants and department stores. If you're spending the money anyway, why not help our church in the process? Local food banks can also use gift cards for grocery stores. As we heard during a recent mission moment, the Canton Food Bank uses monetary (and gift card) donations to shop for perishable items to give out weekly. That's a win-win!

The Scrip table is open in the Parish Hall every Sunday during coffee hour. Stop by to see what gift cards we have available for immediate purchase, for ordering to pick up the following week, or to just find out more about our program. Check out raiseright.com to find out even more about how scrip works or to set up an online account. There is even an app for that! Search "raiseright" in your app store. You can shop from the comfort of your own couch any time of day or night and pick up your order in church the following week or have them shipped to your house! Shopping and helping really don't get easier than that. We'd also love to have more people to help run the table during coffee hour. Even if you can only commit to once a month or less it would help a lot.

### Carrying On

We all know situations in our past or in the past of our family or friends, where one person or group has been charged with carrying on a tradition or obligation or some commitment that a prior relationship has borne. That kind of "carrying on" certainly occurs within a church like ours, to wit., some history from the 1820's.


Rev. Brenda spoke within the last month about this commitment of carrying on. In her words, she referenced a circumstance which occurred during the pastorate of our longest-serving minister, Rev. Jeremiah Hallock. Rev. Hallock served our church from 1785 to 1825, a term of forty years. During that term of service, Rev. Hallock maintained a standard of diligence with respect to his congregants that was at the time, and since, remembered with veneration.

When Rev. Hallock died, he had preached the prior Sunday and then succumbed to some disease process mid-week. He is buried in our cemetery across the street, near the front and in the most northern quarter of the property. On his stone, it says,"may his mantle fall to his successor". His successor was Rev. Jairus Burt, who followed Hallock and served for another thirty years from 1826 to 1856. Imagine - two ministers covering the span of seventy (70) years. Impressive!

When Rev. Burt passed, he was buried in our cemetery as well (toward the back of the third quarter to the north) and his cemetery stone, an obelisk shown here, has a mantle or cape carved into the top of the stone to reflect the saying on the Hallock stone that Hallock's mantle fell onto his successor, Rev. Burt.

We have some fine examples of devoted service to reflect upon within the people who have and are serving our church.


