ON MAKING NEW STARTS

To walk the way of sacred unknowing is to remember that our best ways of thinking and speaking about God are provisional. They are always in process – reflecting our limited perspectives, responding to our particular lives and times, relating us to our ancestors in the faith even as they flow out toward the God who remains free to act in ways that confound us. If our ways of thinking and speaking of God are not at least that fluid, then they are not really theologies but theolatries – things we worship instead of God.

New starts. New beginnings. Every turn of the calendar to January, every year, tends to plant in us the idea that we ought to be starting new with something or other. The feeling may not last all that long, but something deep in us seems to know the wisdom of "Behold, I make all things new" (Revelation 21:5) and to believe it applies to us.

The thing is, being able to make new starts and find new avenues for life requires an openness in us. It requires a sense in us that things don't have to be finished, closed, fixed, done, knowable, predictable or changeless in order to be okay—that we can not only abide through, but thrive in, the evolutions of this life, in us and around us. It means we'll have to trust process, and trust living itself, without needing to know outcomes and destinations before they are knowable. Or when they are simply not knowable at all. We are sometimes not good at this, as individuals or as churches.

The spiritual writer Barbara Brown Taylor reminds us that even our ideas of God are always in process, "provisional," as she says. There needs to be a fluidity about them, because, of course, our ideas about God are not themselves God. Our words about God are not God. Our traditions about God are not God. All humanly-created expressions and understandings are part of the evolutionary universe, where they keep moving if they are at all alive. And if we are unable to let them keep moving with that kind of fluidity, what we may have, Taylor says, are not theologies but "theolatries – things we worship instead of God." Things we prefer in their fixed-ness to the uncontainable, moving spirit of the actual God who journeys with us.

The start of this new year is a good time to remember that as with every other year we have lived, this one stretches out before us full with gifts unknown...with joys and challenges that will appear, with paths that may not be marked out yet but that we'll make by walking, with new glimpses of a living God who is contained in no box.

May it also be filled with faith, hope, and love.

As we turn the page on 2022 and begin a new year, it's easy to just say Christmas is over. Or is it? The twelve days of Christmas is more than just a happy holiday song. And the twelfth day of Christmas, also known as Epiphany, is more than just a word. We may tend to look past this day as we recharge during the month of January, yet we are reminded of the reason that Epiphany is one of the oldest festival days of the Christian church with a meaning that transcends into everyday life.

Faith Formation News

Dr. Hollace Bristol, Director of Faith Formation

We continue to be inspired by our Church School children. How wise they are, how willing they are to consider big ideas. The season of Advent has provided Karen and I with the opportunity to reach beyond the surface with the concepts of hope, peace, joy, and love. We had our own Advent wreath in Church School and the children lit the candles each of the four weeks. As we explored these big ideas, we asked the children week by week, "What does hope look like?" "What does peace look like?" "What does joy look like?" and "What does love look like?" We provided them with paper, markers and crayons, building blocks, lengths of rope, and an imaginary stage. We turned them loose to create an expression of these concepts by drawing something, building something or acting the idea out. We then asked them to explain their creation and we related the idea to the season of Advent and talked about the Christmas story and all the ways we prepare for this celebration of Jesus' birth.

On the fourth Sunday, we carried it a bit further and asked them not only "What does love look like?" but "What does love sound like?" What does love feel like?" and What does love taste like?" They answered, "Love feels like a warm hug." "Love tastes like warm cookies that Mom bakes." "Love feels like a wet kiss from a beloved pet dog, or a nudge from the nose of a favorite horse." Then we asked them "How big is love?" and "Where does love come from?" Again, their answers were so insightful.

On Sunday, January 22nd, Karen and I will offer a second hour after the church service to introduce you all to the experiential method within which we structure our Church School lessons. We will format the hour around playing with some big ideas and leading you through some activities to realize differently some of the lessons Jesus came to teach. We hope you will join us.
