A SPIRITUAL PRACTICE TO TRY FOR LENT: SILENCE



There is a reason why nature's beauty can leave you speechless.

The numinous needs no descriptives. Language is a utility that quickens the mind but deadens the senses.*

I recently read this quote, and it kind of stopped me in my tracks. I am a person who does what I do in the world, vocationally, largely through language: writing, preaching, offering conver-sations on spiritual things, participating in the organizational processes of a church, all using words. Not that that is the only form the pastoral role takes, of course; there are forms of presence that don't depend on words at all. But generally speaking, a pastor uses language to do what she does. As do most of us.

But then comes this reminder that while language is needed for some things, it can actually impede us in other things. That "it quickens the mind but deadens the senses." That it can help us think and articulate and reason, but that when we try to lay it upon the sheer majesties of nature, taken in through our senses, it can be an ill-fitting response. Trying to put into words what you feel at the edge of the Grand Canyon or at the edge of the ocean, in the midst of a forest or in your backyard garden, can be a way to diminish that very experience, as our words will always be too small for "the numinous." Those experiences really need our silent wonder, as a way of being conscious of the God beyond all words.

Many of us don't have much actual silence in our lives. We fill moments, hours, days, with sound... TV often on in the background just so there *won't* be silence. But what if we were to welcome more of it? What if we were to try it out as a Lenten practice, something we commit to doing on a regular basis at least for the weeks of Lent, and see if there's anything there that we might want to continue as a way of being? What if we were to start with five minutes a day, finding some place to be where we need not speak, and see what arises in our spirits when we are not trying to explain or comment on anything with words, just to notice and appreciate it and let it move us without words?

Look around and behold. Close your eyes and listen. Like clouds, evanescent thoughts float aimlessly through the panorama of the mind. Then, as the chatter of self-talk settles, the stillness allows feelings once neglected to come out from hiding. In the quiet you may suddenly feel grief, a clandestine sadness you did not know was there grounding you to the real. You might likewise be surprised by joy, for no reason at all, other than the raw, unpredictable thrill of being, palpably present in the absence of words. Though hard to articulate, which may be no accident, in the emptiness there is a sense of peace, and something close to divine. Thomas Keating said silence is God's original language; everything else is mere commentary. *

A Bible Study for Lent at Canton Center Church PARABLE SUBVERTS WORLD: How the Parables of Jesus Aim to Upend our Thinking

New Testament scholar John Dominic Crossan says that within Biblical literature, there are the broad types of *myth* and *parable*, and that "Myth establishes world, parable subverts world." While Biblical texts that take the form of myth aim to tell us what the world is like, those that take the form of parable aim to turn upside down how we typically see that same world, in the service of some essential spiritual wisdom. Since Jesus teaches so largely in parables, what can we learn by encountering them as challenges to our ordinary way of seeing things? We'll look at a few of them together, in conversation.

A Faith Conversation for Lent at Canton Center Church WHEN GOD FALLS OFF THE CEILING

In a 2020 book called *Saving God from Religion*, UCC pastor, teacher and writer Robin Meyers tells about a dream he had where Michelangelo's famous painting on the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel, the one where God's and Adam's outstretched hands reach toward each other but don't quite touch, falls to the floor and shatters. He uses this as a metaphor for thinking about how traditional images and understandings of God have likewise come crashing down for so much of the modern world, giving organized religion "a God crisis" and leaving us in need of new ways of relating to the sacred and each other. We'll read one chapter of the book (will be made available as a handout) as a prompt for our conversation together about our own thinking/re-thinking of traditional concepts of God.

What does LENT mean to me?

I didn't think too much about the Lenten period of the Easter season until Reverend Rushan Sinnaduray was our preacher and introduced different ways of reflection during this most important part of the church calendar year. It was Reverend Rushan's interpretation of the Lenten season with his introduction of music he called Lenten Vespers with each Sunday full of beautiful biblical verse intertwined with worldwide music created by many instruments and talented musicians. Those who attended the 4 pm service each of the four Sundays was in for a treat of scripture, meditation, reflective fellowship and soothing, beautiful music from all instrumental genres from jembe drums, flute, guitar, piano and gorgeous human vocals. This experience transformed my practice of Lent from non-existent to a more spiritual, introspective experience.

This is a month or more that we have an opportunity to think about our own deserts and how to navigate the dry land through drought with all of its challenges so that we can come out the other side as Jesus did.

Lent is a time to create intentional quiet moments to contemplate our inner challenges and set the path for solutions and success. Jesus was challenged and tempted and yet persevered for all of us so that we can thrive.

What a most important time of the church year to reflect on hardships and calculate how to move on. Try to make time to make time and space for this valuable Lenten experience.

From the President

In light of the knowledge that Reverend Brenda is getting ready to follow a new path in her journey at the end of April of this year, I have no doubt that you are wondering about our church's next steps. Thus, I would like to touch base with all of you, regarding the UCC's Search and Call Journey and where we are in that process. It is very early but having said that, we have certainly gotten it off the ground, and that includes quick work by the Diaconate to line up Supply (substitute) Ministers for May, June and July. They have done so because it is quite probable that we will not have an Interim Minister in place at that time. We would, in fact, be very lucky to have one by then. It appears, though, that there will be some consistency during those months, which is a real blessing!

We are now beginning Phase I: Ending Ministry Well. This includes planning a Good Goodbye for Rev. Brenda. There will be a Service of Release and a Celebration on Sunday, April 30th. Our Southern New England Area Conference Minister, the Reverend Isaac Lawson will be attending and taking part in this service. The Celebration will be planned and organized by the Diaconate, Faith Formation, and Wider Church. Put the date on your calendars if you have not already!

Another important part of Phase I is for the Interim Search Committee to have an Exit Interview with Rev. Brenda to share our learnings, blessings, and challenges together. This helps provide closure and can help us in creating our profile and in our search. Phase I also includes the creation by the Council of said Interim Search Committee. This has been done. This committee includes our first vice president/president to be, Grant Hagedorn, our second vice president/first vice president to be, Anne Ziemba, our chair of Trustees, Phil LeGeyt, one of our senior deacons to be, Bev Sealand, and myself, the outgoing president. We have had an initial constructive and informative meeting with Rev. Isaac, laying the groundwork for our work. We are now beginning the process of creating our Church Profile and considering compensation for an Interim Minister, with the help of the UCC Search and Call guidelines as well as the overall needs of our church.

When our Church Profile is complete, the Committee will submit it to Rev. Isaac for approval. When approved it will be sent by him to the Search and Call Program Associate, Jill Ford, who will then post it to the National UCC Opportunities Listing page. Candidates then interested in having their profiles sent to our church will contact Jill who will forward them to us. Then the interviewing process begins. Based upon the information we have been given, we anticipate it will be at least September before we might have an Interim in place and it could be considerably longer. At the Annual Meeting on Sunday, March 5th, we will have more information for you about the different types of Interims that exist. We will seek congregational input around that, at that time and in the following couple of weeks. We hope to see you then!
