WORSHIP MINISTRY



There seems to have been a revolution of sorts in society regarding church attendance with fewer adults attending and thus fewer children and young men and women. In past years the Junior Choir would have numbered anywhere between 12 and 20 and the Cherub choir at last count in 2019 numbered 18. Sadly those days seem to be over and why is that you ask. I believe and know there are multiple factors involved such as scheduling school and travel team games and practices on Sundays starting around 2007. Also, religion seems to be under attack in many ways. It has been taken out of our public schools. At one time not that long ago, church was considered a family activity. Sadly, that is no longer true in some cases. I consider myself very lucky to have a rather large senior choir and bell choir with what I consider very loyal folks as well as reliable guest singers and ringers. I have a total of 23 choir members with some doing double duty. We are also lucky to have accomplished instrumentalists.

On another note, I am always disappointed by the lack of congregational participation in the Maundy Thursday service. I have worked under four ministers, all great and all with different approaches to that service. It is a very contemplative one with many scripture readings and appropriate music and choir participation and it is sort of a metaphor for the last supper and everyone leaves in silence when it is over. This year we had 24 participants, including choir members, all the deacons, lighting crew, sound and the minister and me but only about 24 congregants. Please think about attending that in the future.

As the school year is winding down, the bell choir has finished for the year with a stunning piece, Recuerdos (Memories) accompanied with piano (me) and my son and Meg's twin Jon Keefe on guitar. I can't even say how many people complimented me and also the ringers and that indeed makes it all worthwhile.

The Senior choir and also guest singers have three more rehearsals with their last on June 12th and their last appearance in church on the 18th. After that the Summer Soloist Series will kick in with Jerry leading the way on June 25th. Part of the choir's repertoire presently include What A Wonderful World and the Hallelujah Chorus from Handel's Messiah which will both be sung at the memorial service for Dick and Janice Anderson on June 3rd. Accompanying the song What A wonderful World will be Scott Neumann on guitar and Rose Minichiello on Sax.

Moment for Missions:

Catherine Haugh, AASW Coordinator from Covenant to Care for Children, was our guest for the Moment for Missions on May 21st. As explained on their website (covenanttocare.org) "Covenant to Care for Children provides a safety net for abused, neglected, or impoverished children in Connecticut by providing essential support in moments that are critical for a child's ability to thrive and a family's ability to stay together." Through their Adopt a Social Worker program (AASW), "community and faith-based organizations partner with a particular social worker to provide, as far as is possible, for the necessary and special items needed by the children in that worker's caseload."

Our congregation has supported social workers at Wellmore Behavioral Health (wellmore.org) for several years as they help children and families in the Torrington area. We've provided backpacks and school supplies, holiday gifts, Thanksgiving meals, gift cards for Christmas and Easter, etc. During our Moment for Missions, Catherine led us in renewing our contract with Covenant to Care and promising to continue supporting our social worker.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH MINISTRY



Would you like to help provide sandwiches for Brian's Angels during the summer? Do you want to do it on a day that's convenient for you? We will not have scheduled days to get together and make a meal or sandwiches during June, July, and August. However, homelessness and hunger do not take a vacation during the summer.

If you or your family are interested in helping, there are a couple of different ways to volunteer. You can go to the Brian's Angels website (briansangels.org), click on See How You Can Help and then scroll down and click on Meal Train. You'll see the calendar where you can sign up to make sandwiches, make a meal, or provide groceries like fruit or bottled water. You'll need to create a user name and password to sign up. They do not send you lots of emails, but they will send your reminders if you request them.

If you'd prefer, you can call or text Martha Stansel at 860-747-5344 or email her at mwstsl@gmail.com. She will help set you up for your preferred time through the church's signup account. She can also send you instructions for making and delivering sandwiches or a meal.

Also, if you're cleaning out your attic, garage, etc. this summer, don't forget that **Brian's Angels can always use tents, tarps, and sleeping bags**. If you get them to the church, we'll make sure they get delivered.

Missions Box:



The June and July Missions Box collection will be backpacks and school supplies for the children served by Wellmore. Some of the suggested items for donation are pencils, pens, markers (non-permanent), colored pencils, crayons, binders, notebook paper, spiral notebooks, colorful folders including pocket folders, glue sticks, blunt scissors, tape, rulers, and so on. In other words, any supplies a child would need to have a good start and be successful in school.

Since we will not be worshiping in our sanctuary during the month of August, we will resume Missions Box collections in September. Watch the next Churchmouse for more info.


Thank you to Dan Bristol for once again providing beautiful pansy plants for our congregation on Mother's Day, a tradition begun by
