This was a bell that belonged to a certain lady named Megan. She helped to carefully wrap it up and was determined to get it repaired. The next morning she called Malmark, the company that makes them and also repairs them, learned that it was not under warranty and that they would send out a kit to repair it. The bell was one of the several original bells that were purchased in 1982 and therefore over 40 years old. The next step was to find a choir that could lend us that same bell. The next call went to Mark Mercier, music director at the Simsbury Congregational who very graciously gave Megan several names of choir directors in the area. She was able to track down one in Simsbury that was not using that particular bell. In the meantime we are awaiting the delivery of the parts and Megan's brother Jason has promised to try to fix it. Megan is my daughter and Jason my son. Let us hope the C4 will be fixed post haste.

The Senior Choir in the next few weeks will be doing double duty in that they will rehearse for the regular Sunday anthems as well as work on a cantata entitled "Have You Heard" by Joel Raney. They experienced a taste of it Monday night as we listened to the opening song and then sang it with very positive comments. The choir and guest singers, Dan, Meg, and Gert, will be presenting it on Dec. 17th during the regular Sunday service. Additionally, there will be a small orchestra accompanying it: flute-Cindy Webb, a consort of recorders, Marianne Rannenberg, drums and guitar- Jon Keefe, piano and organ. Following the service will be an enhanced coffee hour. This is sure to get everyone in the mood for the holidays.

The Senior Choir sings most, if not all, Sundays. The handbell choir will be playing on the following dates: Oct. 29, Nov. 19, Dec. 17, and Christmas Eve.

Deacon's Bench Phil Doyle



As the greater Canton Center Church community moves through the process of ministerial change, following the retirement of Reverend Brenda, the Sunday service will, by necessity, evolve and reflect the moment. The variety of service styles and sermon messages from the numerous "Supply Pastors" has been educational and enlightening. Each visiting "Supply Pastor" brought something unique and positive to our Church. With our Interim Minister, Reverend Kurt Satherlie, the Diaconate looks forward to the challenge of fresh ideas, and like you, expects some change. It is the express intent of the United Church of Christ to use the interim period to create change and insert a time of separation between periods of settled ministry. Discussion over the time interval between settled pastors is inevitable, as is discussion about styles and preferences. Most Church members have been through such a time before, we let the process unfold. Perhaps, the sense of change has been magnified by the recent COVID period. COVID initially forced isolation then a period of social distancing. Our Church created an on-line Sunday service streaming system, and upon return to in person services, the Diaconate modified the service to include social distancing protocols. Now that we have emerged from the COVID period, we are able to incorporate some traditional aspects of the service such as the separate serving of bread and wine (juice) during Communion and the passing of the collection plate. During the COVID period, the Diaconate took attendance by name; that process has recently been eliminated, there being less chance of a mass COVID infection event. Another example of change may be the modification of the Doxology to modernize the language, while keeping the sense of tradition. As we all move forward into Reverend Kurt's interim ministry, we look to focus upon the spiritual health of the Church and the needs of the membership. Please remember, the Diaconate is elected to represent your interests. The congregation membership owns and controls the church and the services; let the Diaconate know your thoughts and preferences. What change and/or stabilizing influences best reflect your thoughts about the service? How should the services evolve to reflect the congregational needs?

We even have Visa cards available in various denominations – with no activation fee that you would pay if you bought them in the store. Of course, grocery stores remain our most popular cards - Stop & Shop and Shop Rite are available every week in different denominations. The ways you can use Scrip gift cards are only limited by your imagination! And don't forget that every card you purchase – big or small – earns money for our church.


