Message from the pastor...

Dear Church Family,

John 16:33, reminds us that *In this world you will have trouble*. However, Jesus continues, *But take heart! I have overcome the world*. Just as April showers lead to beautiful blooms, here in Colebrook we get invested with pesky gnats in April and May. The joys of Spring with its beauty and new growth all around along with the troublesome biting flies and normal heavy rains can be a metaphor for our lives.

A Gothic Undertaking

Our church has undertaken some big capital campaigns in our recent past, as in the last forty years (the extension of the Parish Hall in1986) or the last sixty years (the return of the meetinghouse to its original interior appearance in 1968). And those campaigns were expensive (more than \$100,000 each).


The window segments that were displayed in the meetinghouse recently, part of the stained glass windows that were part of the Gothic interior, encouraged me to share a bit about that Capital Campaign from 1874. I think most of you have seen the picture of the interior from the completion of that project, the false ceiling, the wooden vaults, the windows down each side of the church and large stained glass window that was on the west end of the church room where the pulpit is now.

Some of us remember the Gothic interior and maybe the back and forth within the congregation to initiate the renovation from Gothic to original - quite a process and quite a change. I imagine that it was equally as challenging to come to agreement in 1874 to change the interior from the original to Gothic. The pulpit and the balconies had to come down to make room for the windows. Thankfully, in my opinion, the pews were kept so that we have something from the original 1814 building interior along with some of the windows in the East end of the church room.

The choir loft was walled off for the Gothic conversion with a full wall at what is the east end of the church room and a rose window installed, which allowed the sunlight of the Sunday morning to shine into the Church. That window is now installed (with backlighting) in the entryway between the church room and the Parish Hall. There were five windows installed on each side of the church room, each window unit about 10 feet high and consisting of five pieces.

The whole project was documented in the two books that are shown here and the accounts were kept by the Superintendent, J. Howard Foote, including a record of who offered a share or shares, and an accounting of the work done by the bills payable throughout the almost year of the work. The whole project was completed for a cost of over \$3000!

It was quite a change to make such a change to the Puritan Meetinghouse and not quite as much but still a significant change to remove the Gothic decor and return to the original. As you look at the window sections of the Gothic style displayed in our church now, try to imagine the incentive of our forebears to make such a change!

Our 8th Scrip Anniversary!

Another April, another Scrip Anniversary!

In early 2016, I was sitting in a special council meeting and the trustees had been exploring lots of options to increase revenue and reduce expenses. The scrip fundraising program had been previously brought to their attention and they had researched it and explained to council briefly how it worked. It seemed like an easy way to bring in a modest addition to our bottom line and it was up for grabs if anyone was interested in coordinating it. I could hardly stop myself from volunteering, as often happens. I did some additional research, the treasurer opened up a dedicated bank account, and in April, we set up a table for the first of hundreds of coffee hours.

Over these last 8 years, we have raised around \$12,000 for the church. While it's nothing to balance the budget on, it's an easy fundraiser with no real downside.

If you don't know about the Scrip program, here is a quick synopsis. Scrip is an easy way you can help raise money for the church by buying gift cards for everyday expenses like groceries, gas, clothing, restaurants and gifts. It is literally "fundraising while you shop" and there are nearly 600 retailers to choose from. The best part about Scrip is that you pay for exactly what you get and the church makes money by purchasing the gift cards at less than face value. You can also order scrip online or through the RaiseRight app. Add gift cards to your cart and either pay by check, credit card or through an automatic withdrawal from your checking account.
