Grace and peace to you from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. (1 Corinthians 1:3)

April brings us a season of vibrant growth, both in the familiar beauty of our surroundings and within the quiet spaces of our hearts. We witness the buds unfurling on our trees, the first brave flowers pushing through the earth, and listen to the joyful melodies of returning birds. The Saga of the Church Organ

A few years ago during the pandemic, a new sound system was installed in the loft, next to the organ. Apparently there must have been some kind of installation mishap but nobody was the wiser. One day when I turned on the organ there was a clicking sound and that was when I discovered a contraption behind the organ that I remembered that Larry Minichiello had installed.

The organ seemed to sound okay and my ears didn't detect any negatives. Meanwhile, I had a great need for organ subs, one of whom was Asher who apparently had trouble with the organ one of those subbing days. This led Phil and Tim to further investigate the problem and called me. I suggested they get Alan MacMillan, organist at Trinity who is very well versed in digital organs and they did. Apparently he was able to get it started and also realized the external speakers were not working. As soon as I was able I tried out the organ to see if that clicking sound was working and it was not so I tried to get in touch with Larry and he did call me back and referred us to the installer of the sound system who came to the church and voila the next time I played the organ the added machine clicked and the sound was definitely coming out of the external speakers.

The **Missions Box collection for April** is change for **Holy Joe's Café**. In 2006, members of The First Congregational Church in Wallingford started Holy Joe's Café to support chaplains in Iraq and Afghanistan by providing coffee to serve the troops. Holy Joe's Café has grown since then and currently ships coffee and supplies to hundreds of military locations. As stated on their website, "Holy Joe's Café has become a dynamic part of military Chaplains 24/7/365 service to the troops...in 70 countries throughout the world." As one chaplain explains, "Holy Joe's Café is a place where chaplains in makeshift chapels are able to bring a taste of home to the tired, the anxious, the angry, the lonely and the wounded. They all can get a gourmet coffee, a reminder that the world they willingly left behind still cares."

Our church has supported Holy Joe's for a number of years by collecting change (and bills), often during Lent. Maybe you have some change hanging around your house, or maybe you want to think about contributing the equivalent of your daily cup of coffee. You can save your money in the cup we'll provide or another container of your choice. We know that, in this day and age, many people do not use much cash or change. Checks, paper money, and change are all acceptable for donation. We will have a jar for contributions on the small table at the front of the sanctuary. Please be generous to support our troops.



Thank you to everyone who purchased gift cards for Wellmore and brought cleaning supplies for Canton Food Bank during March. The gift cards will be delivered in early April so families can shop for Easter. The cleaning supplies were delivered mid-March.

Our 9th Scrip Anniversary!

Another April, another Scrip Anniversary!

In early 2016, I was sitting in a special council meeting and the trustees had been exploring lots of options to increase revenue and reduce expenses. The scrip fundraising program had been previously brought to their attention and they had researched it and explained to council briefly how it worked. It seemed like an easy way to bring in a modest addition to our bottom line and it was up for grabs if anyone was interested in coordinating it. I could hardly stop myself from volunteering, as often happens. I did some additional research, the treasurer opened up a dedicated bank account, and in April, we set up a table for the first of hundreds of coffee hours.

Over these last 9 years, we have raised over \$12,000 for the church. While it's nothing to balance the budget on, it's an easy fundraiser with no real downside.

If you don't know about the Scrip program, here is a quick synopsis. Scrip is an easy way you can help raise money for the church by buying gift cards for everyday expenses like groceries, gas, clothing, restaurants and gifts. It is literally "fundraising while you shop" and there are nearly 600 retailers to choose from. The best part about Scrip is that you pay for exactly what you get and the church makes money by purchasing the gift cards at less than face value. You can also order scrip online or through the RaiseRight app. Add gift cards to your cart and either pay by check, credit card or through an automatic withdrawal from your checking account. For more information on how to sign up online and get our enrollment code, just reach out. PALM SUNDAY POT LUCK DINNER April 13, 2025



A long standing tradition at the church is the Palm Sunday Pot Luck Dinner where everyone gets the opportunity to bring a favorite dish. As always, we are excited to have the dinner this year. The dinner is always well attended and a lot of fun. It gives members and friends the opportunity to spend some time with each other in a very relaxed and social setting while enjoying a superb meal. For new members or those not accustomed to pot luck dinners the following is offered so you know what to expect.

- People who will be coming to the dinner are asked to sign-up on the list outside the kitchen door and indicate a category of dish that they'll be bringing. This helps all of us know what types of dishes are being brought and therefore helps us decide what our own offering should be. A special category is baked ham. It generally takes 3 or 4 baked hams to serve everyone. There will be a column to check if you would like to bring a ham for your contribution. A count of the sign-ups allows the Wider Church Fellowship Committee know how many tables to set and how many supplies to buy.
- On the day of the dinner, bring your dish to the kitchen before you go into church. Someone will be in the kitchen to receive your contribution. Let it be known if your dish is a cold dish or if it needs to be heated before serving. Salads and desserts that need chilling will be kept in the refrigerator. The committee will heat the hot dishes in the ovens and assure that everything is put out on the serving tables at the proper time.
- We'll gather for dinner right after the church service.
- The fellowship committee will provide coffee, tea, water, juice and milk.
- With so many appetizing things to choose from, most people tend to eat a bit more than they normally do at home (this is part of the fun). To accommodate this and assure that there is enough food to go around everyone is asked to bring an amount that is more than what would be needed for their family group.

We hope to see a big turn out on Palm Sunday April 13th. If you haven't been to a pot luck before, give it a try. You won't be disappointed!


